Dashing Through the (Sidewalk) Snow

Doggy & Kitty Care –Common winter chemicals like ice-melting salts, windshield wiper fluids, and antifreeze can be deadly for cats and dogs. Signs like vomiting and loss of coordination can



appear within an hour. If you think your pet has consumed even the smallest amount of antifreeze, take him to the veterinarian immediately. Pet-friendly antifreeze is propylene glycol-based and is now available at retail stores.

Ice-melting salts can stick to your pet's paws. Licking his paws also puts your pet at risk for consuming the chemicals found in ice melts.

Look for pet-safe ice-melting products, and wash your pet's feet with a warm cloth after coming in from outside.

Stopping for School Buses – Know when you need to stop for a school bus when its lights and stop signs are activated. Review the map to remind yourself of your driving obligations when approaching a school bus.



Blizzardy Budgeting

Creating a budget is a great way to track where your money goes each month and an important step to getting your finances in order. A budget can make it easier for you to achieve financial milestones, such as building an emergency fund or saving for a down payment on a home.



Step 1: List your income – what money you get for a month. We'll keep it simple.

Step 2: List your expenses. There are 2 types of expenses: fixed and variable. Fixes are those expenses that do not change, like rent or car payments. Variable expenses do change each month. Electricity is a variable expense, and so are groceries, gasoline, and eating out. These are the ones you can monitor and change your spending if necessary.

Then there are those expenses that don't occur every month, like the HOA dues, Travel, and Property Taxes. Let's look at the HOA dues. They are due May 1. So, for a budget beginning January 2024, you take the total dues amount, 270 and divide it by the number of months you have before payment is due, which is 4 (Jan thru April is 4 months) = 67.50/month (we'll round up to 68). For budgets Jan-April, you put the 67.60 into your savings account, and then in May you take the entire amount out and pay the bill. Then for May and beyond, the monthly HOA amount would be 270 / 12 = 22.50, which you put into savings and in May 2024, you take the 270 you saved during the year and pay your dues.

This strategy of spreading expenses over the 12 months helps to keep you and your finances from being "surprised" at big ticket items that you know are going to happen, like the three-week travel cruise you are planning to take in June, or Christmas gift purchases in December.

Q3: Where do snowmen put their money?



Step 3: Subtract expenses from income. The goal is to have this number be zero or more. If the sum is a negative number, your budget is out of alignment, and income needs increased, expenses need decreased, or both! Here we could probably decrease groceries by \$8 and still be ok.

Step 4: Tracking. Most people stop before this step. This is where you track what you spend during the month. Every. Single. Expense. Then you compare your actual expenses with your planned, budgeted expenses, and make adjustments. Tracking helps you identify and eliminate wasteful spending habits, promote better financial habits like saving and investing, sort out financial priorities, understand why you may be in debt and how you got there, and design a strategy for getting out of debt.

Step 5: Adjust. Adjust the amounts in your budget to meet your reality. Adjust your reality (impulsive and short-term pleasure spending) to meet your budget.


